Description: This is going to be a collaborative seminar consisting of personal anecdotes, reflections, multimedia content, and small group discussion. The session will focus on the issue of education in a Post-Election Culture and seek to address the importance of respecting the principles of the Las Positas College Values statement and bringing them into sharper focus in a time of confusion, anger, and uncertainty. We seek to promote an institutional culture focused on inclusiveness, diversity, and respect. This seminar is not intended to intensify the political divide between different philosophies, but rather to help everyone understand the need for unity with the provision that it may take some respectful dialogue to get there. We hope that the outcome of our activity is the promotion of a campus culture in which diversity is celebrated and there is no tolerance for hate speech, racism, or suppression of minority voices.





### Beyond Tolerance/Embracing Diversity

#### Metacognition and Math Anxiety

Description: Metacognition is crucial for academic performance. Students' inability to self-assess accurately can lead to difficulties in learning. Students tend to display overconfidence in predicting knowledge and performance, particularly at the basic skills level. This is true across a variety of academic subjects (e.g. English, math, chemistry), though miscalibration in metacognitive judgments is most striking in math. This suggests that math anxiety plays an additional role in student metacognition that is not present in other academic subjects, though this manifests in unexpected ways. Psychological and physiological stress can also affect student metacognition, and student beliefs about their relative ability (rank) within a group of peers can further influence metacognitive judgments and performance satisfaction. In learning what causes student metacognition to go wrong, we as educators can find ways to aid students in developing their metacognitive skills and prevent misconceptions about learning. This workshop would address staff development and student advising/guidance/orientation. Understanding our students can help us anticipate needs in the learning environment and while counseling one-on-one. This workshop is provided through support of the Basic Skills Committee.

#### Islamophobia Panel in Post 9/11 America

Description: After the 2016 Presidential results came in, a new challenge was posted to college nationwide: how to teach in a new type of post-election culture. The new challenge was how to balance an academic environment where ideas can be expressed freely with the problematic yet legitimized rhetoric of hate speech. Two groups, Muslims and perceived Muslims, were targets of hate speech aimed at by a Presidential Candidate. Islamophobia delivered in this candidate's speeches emboldened many across the country to harass and intimidate Muslim people or those whom they perceived to be Muslim. To that end, the LPC Peace and Social Justice Club will bring





a panel of speakers including LPC Professor of Anthropology Kweku Williams and Zahra Billoo, Esq. and E.D. of the Council of American-Islamic Relations (CAIR).
