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## LPC Hosts Green Economy & Climate-Tech Symposium

Las Positas College recently hosted a highly successful Green Workforce Economy Climate-Tech Symposium. "Decarbonizing Our Economy: Technology & Workforce Solutions for a Sustainable Future," at the Mertes Center for the Arts. This collaborative event, led by Innovation Tri-Valley Leadership Group, Livermore Lab Foundation, Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, and Startup Tri-Valley, brought together leaders from government, technology, and education. symposium focused on carbon dioxide removal technologies, workforce development, and strategies to advance regional climate-tech initiatives and support a green economy.

The event featured highlights such as the Roads to Removal report presented by LLNL scientists, which outlined a national strategy for reaching net-zero emissions by 2050. Attendees also engaged in discussions about bridging workforce gaps and fostering public-private partnerships. Jason Sydow of Next 47 emphasized the economic potential in decarbonization, while Yolanda Fintschenko of i-GATE highlighted the role of startups in driving innovation.
