Las Positas College (LPC) has been named one of California's top 25 community and career colleges for delivering the highest return on investment (ROI) for students, according to *Golden Returns: A Regional Look at the ROI of California's Community and Career Colleges*. Out of 327 institutions analyzed, LPC ranked 20th, with typical students able to recover their educational costs within just six months of completing their programs.

The recognition reflects LPC's dedication to affordable, high-quality education that opens doors to meaningful careers and transfer opportunities. With annual costs under \$5,000, students graduate well-positioned to earn significantly more than their peers with only a high school diploma, making their investment in an LPC education highly worthwhile.



LAS POSITAS MEDIA STUDENTS MAKE HISTORY

Las Positas College's Journalism and Media Studies (JAMS) program has earned unprecedented national recognition from the Associated Collegiate Press (ACP). For the first time, *The Express*—LPC's student-run newspaper—was named a finalist for the prestigious Newspaper/Newsmagazine Pacemaker Award. LPC's arts and literature journal, *Havik: Crosswalking*, also earned finalist status in the Literary Arts Magazine Pacemaker category, following its Best of Show award earlier this year.



Alumna Olivia Fitts, now at the University of Missouri's School of Journalism, stands out individually as a finalist in four categories, including Reporter of the Year for two-year colleges, columnist, human interest profile, and podcast. JAMS coordinator Melissa Korber praised Fitts' work as "next level," highlighting her article *This Land Is Their Land* for *Naked Magazine*.
