

LAS POSITAS COLLEGE STUDENT GOVERNMENT RESOLUTION 01-2021

RESOLUTION TO IMPLEMENT HYBRID TELECONFERENCING REQUIREMENTS DURING A PROCLAIMED STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the Ralph M. Brown Act requires that all meetings of a legislative body of a local agency be open and public and that any person may attend and participate in such meetings;

WHEREAS, the Brown Act allows for legislative bodies to hold meetings by teleconference, but imposes specific requirements for doing so;

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, in order to address the need for public meetings during the present public health emergency, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order No. N-29-20, suspending the Act's teleconferencing requirements;

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, continuing the suspension of the Act's teleconferencing requirements on September 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, these Executive Orders require certain notice and accessibility requirements;

WHEREAS, the State Legislature (SB 361) on September 16, 2021;

WHEREAS, AB 361 amends the Act without complying with the requirements of the legislative body holds a majority of the findings; and

WHEREAS, Governor Newsom's findings every 30 days in order to address the need for public meetings during the present public health emergency;

WHEREAS, The Chabot-Mandate (BP 5210 and Executive Order) medically compromised and unvaccinated members are not permitted to participate in-person meetings;

RESOLVED, The Student Senate of Las Positas College, in order to address the need for public meetings during the present public health emergency, do hereby adopt the following:

1. That the foregoing resolution be adopted;

Dear LPC Leaders,

On behalf of the students, the Student Senate of Las Positas College formally requests additional rights be given to students during these unprecedented times. Establishing these rights for students of Las Positas College is critical for students' academic goals and their health and safety.

COVID-19 and its subsequent variants have impacted our society in unimaginable ways over the past two years. As an institution, we have acknowledged and counter-acted against barriers that could have prevented students from accessing equal opportunities in higher education due to significant factors such as distance learning and access to technology. Returning to in-person instruction will bridge countless barriers. Yet, students will face a new and unequivocal threat.

The Student Senate of Las Positas College wants to make it known that many students fear being exposed to and contracting COVID-19 which can cause missing critical instruction, assignment deadlines, and scheduled exams. Our students need assurance that they will not be penalized for entering quarantine and promoting a safe learning environment for instructors and classmates. Although returning to in-person instruction is the goal, we need to ensure students have certain protections to safeguard their access to high-level education.

By certifying the rights of students with regards to exposure to the virus, we can promote quarantine periods as an encouraged and welcomed action. As a Senate, we fear students will be apprehensive to quarantine as it may affect their ability to achieve their academic goals. On behalf of our constituents at Las Positas College, the Student Senate formally requests the following rights:

Students' Rights after a COVID Exposure and Quarantine. Students shall:

- Not be penalized for missing or late assignments with assigned start and due dates that fall within the student's quarantine period.
- Not be dropped from classes due to absences and missing assignments.
- Be allowed an opportunity to complete missing assignments, quizzes, and finals that require in-person attendance.
- Be given a reasonable time, a minimum of three weeks upon returning to class after quarantine, to complete: assignments, labs, presentations, essays, projects, quizzes, and exams.
- Have the right to request hybrid modalities if they need or wish for remote instruction during their quarantine period.

We, the Student Senate of Las Positas, would like to thank you for the opportunity to voice the concerns of our students and look forward to a resolution to these student rights requests.

WHEREAS, Las Positas College provides an inclusive, learning-centered, equity-focused environment that offers educational opportunities and support for completion of students' transfer, degree, and career-technical goals while promoting lifelong learning, per Las Positas College's [Mission Statement](#);

WHEREAS, The Las Positas College Student Government's (LPCSG) mission is to support Las Positas College in making the campus a safe, positive, and equitable space for all students, per the LPCSG [Mission Statement](#);

WHEREAS, Having reviewed terms in existing college-wide documents, including Las Positas College's Bylaws, the Student Senate of Las Positas College hereby finds, and does hereby promote exclusivity in a resolution;

Las Positas College Student Government (LPCSG) Constitution

Preamble:

The Las Positas College Student Government, a union of students formed to represent the interest of the student body, seeks to provide means for student representation by maintaining well-established lines of communication throughout the many areas of the community college environment. We hereby establish this Constitution under the authority of the Board of Trustees of the Chabot - Las Positas Community College District.

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section I:

The name of this organization shall be the Las Positas College Student Government, hereinafter referred to as the LPCSG.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section I:

The LPCSG holds the primary responsibility for the leadership and management of the student body in meeting the purpose and responsibility established for it by the Board of Trustees of Chabot - Las Positas Community College District, in accordance with California Education Code 76060, Las Positas Board Policy 5400, and by this Constitution.

ARTICLE III - ORGANIZATION

Section I: Membership

Membership within the LPCSG shall be granted, upon the establishment of student status to all enrolled students of Las Positas College, in accordance with this Constitution and the adopted Bylaws.

Membership entitles the holder to all privileges granted by the Constitution and adopted Bylaws, including the right to vote, hold office, and participate in LPCSG.



Campus Improvement

Governor's January Budget Proposal



- **Overall** – The state budget proposal has \$286 billion in spending, a 9% increase over current fiscal year. General fund spending increases by \$3 billion, to \$213 billion overall.
- **Proposition 98 Funding** – Estimated at \$102 billion, the highest funding level in history and \$8.2 billion more than 2021 funding act.
- **Non-Proposition 98 Funding** – Continued support to buy down Cal STRS and Cal PERS employer rates (unspecified amount).

Community College System



- **5.33% COLA**

- Approximately \$6.3M in additional, ongoing revenue for the District

- **0.5% Growth**

- The District will almost certainly be unable to access any growth funding

- **Significant one-time funds**

- Deferred maintenance and funds to support retention and enrollment strategies are slated to receive large one-time enhancements that could provide greater than \$5 million

Community College System



- **\$100M to augment Student Success Completion Grants**
 - Will expand Cal Grant eligibility
- **Other Items**
 - Augment Part-Time Faculty Health Insurance Program
 - Increase support for financial aid administration
 - Modernize CCC technology and protect sensitive data

Hold Harmless



- Hold Harmless provision will continue through FY 2024-25
- The Governor's Budget proposes to extend the revenue protections in a modified form to avoid creating sharp fiscal declines in 2025-26. Under the proposal, a district's 2024-25 funding would represent its new "floor," below which it could not drop.
- Under this proposal, districts would not receive cumulative COLAs beginning in FY 2025-26 if their SCFF calculation was less than their new revenue "floor". COLA's would essentially become "one-time" in nature

Hold Harmless



- Under this proposal, the next three fiscal years provide financial stability to the District.
- The SCFF “Cliff”, which could have resulted in greater than \$10 million in revenue losses beginning in FY 2025-26, is now largely mitigated.
- Advocacy to include COLAs in FY 2025-26 and beyond for districts still negatively impacted by SCFF will continue.
