The discipline of Sociology offers the AA-T Sociology Program. SOC 1 (Principles of Sociology) meets its core course requirement and all other courses (SOC 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 11, 12, 13) satisfy the elective options.

All nine courses that Sociology offers meet General Education Requirements.

All courses except SOC 7 (Sociology of Sexuality) meet the Social and Behavioral Sciences requirements for AA and AS degree requirements.

SOC 3 (Cultural and Racial Minorities) meets the American Cultures requirement for both the AA and AS degree requirements.

SOC 1 (Principles of Sociology) also fulfills a core required course for the AA degree in the Social Science program. The following courses meet its elective requirement: SOC 3 (Cultural and Racial Minorities), SOC 4 (Marriage and Family Relations), SOC 6 (Social Problems), SOC 7 (Sociology of Sexuality), SOC 11 (Sociology of Gender).

As stated above, the courses that Sociology offers satisfy various college-level requirements such as the General Education Requirements, the Social and Behavioral Sciences requirements for AA and AS degrees, and the American Cultures requirement for both the AA and AS degree requirements. 7. What are the impacts on students, the discipline and the college of NOT filling this faculty position? What are the programs/courses/services that have not been or cannot be offered due to the vacancy? (Be brief and specific. Use your Program Review to complete this section.)

While the discipline of Sociology successfully hired a new full-time faculty last year, the program is still feeling the negative effects from the long shortage of human resources within the department. The lack of additional full-time faculty, despite of the program's steady growth, means the program has not had the resources to focus on some program plans and objectives, such as the effective assessment of the courses and program. With the lack of consistent assessment, the program suffers from a lack of understanding of the effectiveness of the program and its courses. Furthermore, without more faculty members, it is difficult to maintain a consistent evaluation of part-time instructors in order to retain a demonstratively effective and stable pool of part-time instructors. More importantly, the lack of human resources prevents the discipline of Sociology from offering more quality courses and assistance to students.

The courses offered by the Sociology discipline play a vital role in developing students' critical thinking skills in their liberal arts education at Las Positas College. In doing so, sociological training that students receive contributes significantly to their preparation for other courses and their further intellectual growth. In order for the discipline to maintain a steady growth to assist students' learning, securing an additional position would be essential.
