WHY DO YOU WISH TO RUN FOR AN LPCSG POSITION?:

WHAT MAKES YOU STAND OUT COMPARED TO OTHER CANDIDATES FOR THE POSITION YOU ARE APPLYING FOR?:

Usually we associate leadership with being loud or 'in-your-face'. Through learned experience, I've come to believe that quality means more than quantity. Sometimes it just takes one well-thought out plan or action to change someone's life.

Leadership should be intentional, not performative. I listen first in order to fully understand pain points. After internalizing and potentially getting outside input, then I focus on creating a practical solution. To me, the whole process isn't about attention or some bs on a resume to get into a target school or land an internship. It's about staying consistent and actually making sure work gets done.

WHAT ASPECTS OF STUDENT LIFE WOULD YOU SEEK TO IMPROVE? HOW WOULD YOU DO SO?:

One aspect of student life I would like to improve is communication between students and student government. While student government updates Insta and TikTok, not all students follow those accounts, and important updates about events, resources, and decisions can easily be missed. As someone who is not currently a member of student council, I've personally experienced this gap. I often learn about events after they happen or remain unaware of decisions that directly affect students.

To address this, I think that brief weekly summaries of meeting agendas and decisions can be distributed to Zonemails as a default, with an option to 'opt out'. It can be generated with AI dictation or summary software, it just has to inform students of material events and updates.

As a finance student, I'd also like to explore opportunities to strengthen academic and career resources for business and finance majors. Many 4 year universities provide students access to professional platforms such as S&P Capital IQ, Bloomberg terminals, or FactSet. While I understand that securing full institutional access will require funding and administrative coordination, I believe starting conversations about potential partnerships, student discounts, shared access models, or alumni-sponsored initiatives would be a huge first step.

Recruiting for banking and other competitive finance roles is already challenging, even at universities with plenty of resources to spare. Students at LasPo shouldn't feel disadvantaged simply because they attend a community college. We can definitely help to level the playing field and empower students who are willing to go the extra mile for a career in finance.

Many students get stuck in the class then home loop, leaving them no opportunity to make real friends at Las Positas. Community building events work really well for students like that (as it did for me and many of my friends) but people need to know about them and have incentives to go (free food)! I'd make sure that more students view Las Positas College as much of a home as I do.

WHY DO YOU WISH TO RUN FOR AN LPCSG POSITION?:

PLEASE SHARE YOUR CURRENT OR PAST LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE.

In high school, I served as president for three years. In this role, I was fully responsible for communication between students and the administration: representing student interests, conveying their ideas and suggestions to the administration, and informing students of important decisions and changes.

I organized school events, coordinated the work of activists, and conducted tours of our school—a cultural heritage site—for tourists from Moscow. This required responsibility, the ability to speak in front of an audience, and represent the school at a high level.

I regularly collected feedback from students: I found out what changes they wanted to see and what they thought could be improved. WHAT MAKES YOU STAND OUT COMPARED TO OTHER CANDIDATES FOR THE POSITION YOU ARE APPLYING FOR?:

A mentoring system based on volunteer work by second-year students and above could strengthen the bond between those just beginning their journey at Las Positas and those who already have experience and are willing to share it in a friendly and open manner. This isn't just help—it's creating a community where knowledge and support are shared from student to student. Kind of generation to generation. Because I believe that studying at Las Positas like to live a new life, you will never feel same after even one class.

I want to ensure that all student organizations, like newer or smaller clubs, have fair access to resources that older and well-known clubs have. Constructing an easy way for these clubs to express themselves. Currently we offer club fairs and club officer learning conventions that help with marketing and understanding of clubs, but I would want to create a greater emphasis on budgeting and clearer documentation that all clubs need.

I would also want to improve transparency in how student government funds are allocated. I feel that all students deserve to know where their money is going and have an opinion on plans within the school, as creating a safer and preferable environment is also one of the reasons behind having a director of finance.
