Accomplishments:

- Successfully updated 18 course outlines in Spring 2024
- Created a wine stemware loaner program to decrease barrier/cost for students to take wine classes.
- Created a Materials Fee Scholarship program to reimburse students pursuing VWT degrees or certificates for the materials fees they are required to pay for classes.
- Opening the new Viticulture and Winery Technology facilities including Building 3600 Classroom building, Building 3700 Teaching Winery
- TWO people (single faculty and a part-time faculty) packing up the entire program and moving into the new facilities was a huge undertaking.
- Getting all instructional equipment setup and operational in new facility remains a challenge as logistical needs are fluid and changing daily.
- We have acquired new instructional equipment through RAC including 4-300L stainless steel wine tanks to support student projects.

• Lack of personnel is a significant challenge. A Manager of Winery Operations is desperately needed. This new position would oversee winery compliance, facility infrastructure, instructional equipment,

winemaking, tasting room hours, and wine sales; align vineyard production and winemaking with instructional offerings; work with instructional faculty to best utilize program equipment and resources for student instruction; and supervise the part time Lab Tech. A recommendation to hire this position immediately was voted and approved by both the Las Positas College Viticulture and Winery Technology Advisory Board in 2023-24 and 2024-25, and the Las Positas College Viticulture & Enology Foundation Board in 2023-24 and 2024-25.

Program budget remains insufficient. The supply budget and the maintenance budget lines both are
insufficient to meet the needs of the program and have remained UNCHANGED for the last 18 years. When
you consider how the program has been grown (equipment, etc;) this could be considered ridiculous and a
sad oversight. Luckily, the program has been able to draw from the Las Positas College Viticulture &
Enology Foundation budget, and Lottery funds to fill some gaps.

- Moving forward with an wine analysis lab that will service the Livermore Valley's winemakers.

Enrollments have consistently trended upwards since Covid. There were 98 students enrolled in VWT classes in Spring 2024 with 73 of them unique to the VWT program. Enrollments have recovered since COVID.

Gender demographics remain evenly split in the VWT program. In terms of age, around 50% of VWT students are 50 years or older, and 80% of VWT students are 30 years of age or older. We did see an exciting up-tick in younger students in the program in 23/24 which is very important to the VWT program AND the local wine industry.

Race-ethnicity demographics are slowly shifting to greater diversity in line with the college's overall shifts. In Spring 2024, 7% of VWT enrollments were African American, which is great compared to some previous semester when no African American students were enrolled. Percentage of multi-ethnic students is also increasing.

Total course enrollments continue to go up. Productivity has increased. We are close to pre-COVID numbers. There is potential for the enrollments to grow. There is unmet demand for classes. Students continually ask when certain classes will be offered so that they may complete. We need more FTEF.
